

Oriel Traditional Orchestra

The Oriel Traditional Orchestra is a cross-border community orchestra whose members come from Louth, Meath, Monaghan and Armagh and focus on Irish traditional music repertoire from the region arranged especially for the orchestra. The orchestra have performed locally in Co. Louth, as well as Youghal, Co. Cork, at Fleadh Cheoil na hÉireann in Drogheda and the Gerry Whelan Weekend in Cootehill, Co. Cavan.

The OTO performs repertoire from and inspired by the Oriel region with new compositions by members and local composers. Their repertoire includes music from Meath born harper-composer Turlough O'Carolan (1670–1738), South Armagh fiddle player Josephine Keegan (b.1935), and Louth composers Adèle Commins and Daithí Kearney. They also perform music by Brian O'Kane (b.1939) from Ballybay, Co. Monaghan, which he performed with the Siamsa Céilí Band from Dundalk, as well as tunes from local collections. To date, the repertoire has also included music sourced to the Luke Donnellan collection, which formed part of Pádraigín Ní Uallacháin's seminal study *The Hidden Ulster* (2003) and local fiddle player Gerry O'Connor's MA dissertation at Dundalk Institute of Technology (2006). The orchestra has also sought to include new compositions by its members and to date this has included a set from composers and directors Daithí Kearney and Adèle Commins from their album and collection *A Louth Lilt* (2017) and a new set from member Philip McGuinness. As the group develops, it is planned to include some songs from the rich Oriel tradition that has been researched by Pádraigín Ní Uallacháin and some of the region's harp music, which is currently being researched by MA student Sylvia Crawford at DkIT.

The developing relationship between the OTO and Centre for Creative Arts Research at DkIT highlights the shared themes and goals of the members and provides opportunity for a sharing of research, expertise, space and performances. As well as regular performances in the local area, researchers from CARC and the Department of Creative Arts, Media and Music have developed a strong international profile and brought the music of Oriel to audiences globally. DkIT was the first Irish performing group to participate in the International Society for Music Education Conference when it was held in Brazil in 2014, appearing again in Glasgow in 2016. Researchers regularly present their research at Academic Conferences and for other audiences and are



delighted to collaborate with the Oriel Traditional Orchestra. Research projects include the collation and transcription of the music of Brian O'Kane by Dr Daithí Kearney at DkIT, some of which has been arranged for both *Ceol Orghialla* and the OTO. Research on Josephine Keegan undertaken at DkIT will shortly be published as a contribution to a significant work on women and music in Ireland. Other ongoing projects focus on Rory Kennedy and the Siamsa Céilí Band.

Tonight's concert is a celebration of the musical heritage of the Oriel region and marks the coming together of two pillars in the artistic community in the region, the Oriel Traditional Orchestra and Dundalk Institute of Technology. The music reflects both old and new with reference to the local and global, reminding us that music is both timeless and beyond boundaries. Through the music and related stories, we explore our connections to place and to each other.

The first half of the concert features musicians from DkIT, many of whom are studying on the BA (Hons) Applied Music programme. Their arrangements are both old and contemporary and range from tunes associated with local musicians as collected by Dundalk fiddle player and DkIT graduate Gerry O'Connor (b.1958), new compositions by Louth composers and others in the Irish tradition, and repertoire from related traditions including Scotland and Britanny. Those connections are reinforced when we remember that it is 700 years since the Battle of Faughart (1318) when Edward de Bruce, who had been crowned King of Ireland in Dundalk, was killed. 'Bruce's Address' is adapted from a melody associated with Robert Burns' poem of 1793 recalling Edward's brother, Robert and the Battle of Bannockburn (1314). A version is also found in the Luke Donnellan Collection, sourced here to Gerry O'Connor's *The Rose in the Gap* (2018).

The programme also includes two jigs from Clare fiddle player Junior Crehan (1908–1998) and two pieces from American flute and whistle player Joannie Madden (b.1965), the latter composed for the Catskills Irish Arts Week, which is approaching its 25th year. 'The Shy Octopus' and 'Farewell to Fochabers' were composed for friends at Speyfest, in the north east of Scotland, where DkIT have visited to perform on two occasions to date.

The lyrics of the chosen songs trace a variety of themes including memory, connection to place and a world beyond. 'The Hill of Thieves' reminds us of Cúchulainn who fought on the plains hereabout. 'The Dutchman' reminds us of the value of memory and the depth of love while 'Bríd Óg Ní Mháile' celebrates the most beautiful girl in Oriel. Although referring to the Crimean War (1853–1856), 'The Kerry Recruit' reminds us of the Kerryman Austin Stack who was imprisoned in Dundalk Gaol in November 1917 and led a hunger strike there. 'Pound a Week Rise' was written in 1962 and mirrors the sentiments of many union songs whose messages remain current throughout the decades.

The Oriel Traditional Orchestra open their programme with a set of polkas by DkIT composers Dr Adèle Commins and Dr Daithí Kearney, followed by an arrangement of 'The Job of Journeywork'. 'Roslin Castle' is a composition of Scottish composer James Oswald but, as noted in Pádraigín Ní Uallacháin's seminal study on the music of Oriel *A Hidden Ulster*, it is also part of the Patrick

McGahon collection from Dundalk. DkIT was proud to honour Monaghan musician and composer Brian O'Kane in 2017 and the orchestra, which includes a number of members of Brian's family, continue to perform his music. Reaching into Co. Meath, the OTO are proud to perform the music of Turlough O'Carolan (1670–1738). Born in Nobber, O'Carolan is one of the most iconic and best known composers in the Irish tradition. From the old to the new, the OTO is delighted to include two recent compositions by member and DkIT lecturer Philip McGuinness, which are inspired by the local area. These are followed by two tunes learned from local fiddle player Gerry O'Connor, who recently published a book *The Rose in the Gap*, based on research completed at DkIT on the Luke Donnellan Collection and other sources of Irish traditional music. The final set is a well-known reel found in that collection, 'Sporting Paddy', also found in the Donnellan Collection.
